# **Day One**

### Introduction

Regional Advisory Council (RAC) Chair Colin Jeffares welcomed the RAC to the meeting. He noted that the RAC was in the home stretch and had a lot to do in the next two days. He thanked everyone for their perseverance and expressed his sincere appreciation for their hard work over the past 18 months. The focus of the last meeting was on completing the advice to Cabinet sheets and the advice to government document (the RAC's public document). The voting process was explained. The RAC was urged to stick to "show stopper" items rather than getting bogged down in editing or rehashing debate.

### **Honourable Minister Mel Knight**

Hon. Knight provided greetings from the Premier and all of his colleagues in Caucus. He acknowledged the difficulty of the task that the RAC had been assigned, noting that the South Saskatchewan Region (SSR) has 45-50 per cent of Alberta's agricultural production and has been linked historically with ranching. However, 50 per cent of the people in the province also live in this region, with 90 per cent of those being urban dwellers. The SSR is home to the most critical piece of Alberta's water storage capacity and a broad range of industrial activity. The major icons of tourism are in Southern Alberta, the big sellers. He acknowledged the difficulty of the RAC's job and the necessity of the discussions taking place.
